Dear USPTO:

Please take a strong stand against software patents. I studied them for a whole quarter for a research paper and discovered that they were not only not needed but that the industry did fine with out them for a long time. I find the patenting of file formats especially atrocious because it is not only an unneeded monopoly, but it is one that doesn't let you choose not to pay for a patent license because if you did choose not to pay for the license, you are incompatible with everything else. I use (GNU/)Linux, an operating system that is part of an ecosystem of software that is often very innovative, but uses ZERO patents to get to this place of innovation. The computer software industry did fine in it's infancy without patents and we still don't need them today. You can, and should, exclude software from patent eligibility on other legal grounds: because software consists only of mathematics, which is not patentable, and the combination of such software with a general-purpose computer is obvious.
